

## 18 Months

- Runs
- Can say three words
- Drinks from cup held in both hands
- Likes to help a parent
- Walks backwards
- Can build a tower with two blocks

## 2 Years

- Points to six body parts
- Removes clothes
- Combines words
- Throws ball overhead
- Names one picture
- Walks up and down stairs

## 3 Years

- Washes and dries hands
- Names a friend
- Puts on clothing with assistance
- Knows the meaning of words like hot, run, talk and hungry.
- Brushes teeth with help
- Speech is understandable half of the time

## 4 Years

- Can copy a circle
- Hops in place
- Tells use of three objects (i.e. Telephone)
- Names one color
- Understands words like in, on, under

## 5 Years

- Counts five blocks
- Prepares own cereal
- Plays board/card games
- Names four colors
- Defines simple words like ball or house
- Draws person with three body parts

# LEDC

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**This guide shows the normal stages of growth in a young child as determined by various developmental screenings. Many children develop faster than the guide indicates. Those who develop slower than this may have developmental delays. If you are concerned about your child's development, please contact LEDC at 501-676-2786 for screening information.**



### 1 Month

- Able to raise head from surface when lying on tummy
- Pays attention to someone face in his or her direct line of vision
- Moves arms and legs
- Responds to noises such as a bell

### 2 Months

- Smiles and Coos
- Holds head up when lying on tummy
- Says ooo and aah sounds



### 3 Months

- Able to hold head still when held in sitting position
- Brings hands together
- Babbles, laughs, squeals

### 4 Months

- No head lag when pulled to sitting position
- Follows moving objects
- Bears weight on legs
- Grasps a rattle

### 5 Months

- Holds objects
- Stretches out arms to be picked up
- Looks at small objects
- Turns to rattling sound
- Rolls over back to stomach



### 6 Months

- Turns toward sounds or a voice
- Reaches for objects out of his or her reach
- Imitates speech sounds
- Feeds self finger food such as cookies or crackers

### 7 Months

- Can transfer object from one hand to the other
- Can sit for a few minutes without support
- Imitates speech sounds
- Looks for objects such as yarn

### 8 Months

- Combines syllables
- Takes two small objects
- Stands holding onto support
- Says Mama, Dada



### 9 Months

- Waves bye—bye
- Can get to sitting position
- Jabbers
- Can pull self up to standing

### 10 Months

- Bangs two cubes held in hands
- Picks things up with thumb or fingers

### 11 Months

- Plays pat-a-cake
- Stands independently for two seconds
- Indicates wants



### 12 Months

- Plays ball with partner
- Responds to simple verbal requests
- Puts objects in and can take out of container.
- Gets to sitting position without assistance



### 15 Months

- Walks by self
- Scribbles on paper
- Puts blocks in a cup
- Uses one to two words
- Imitates activities
